Tips, Songs, and Rhymes for Parents and Caregivers

Here are ideas and activities to try this week with your child. Each activity is based on one of the **7 Days • 7 Ways** principles of early literacy development and is designed to engage your child, stimulate his or her literacy skills, and enhance the bonds between you.

- **SHARE BOOKS** Ask simple questions when reading to your child so that your child can participate in the storytelling. Examples of appropriate questions include: What is this? What do you see on this page? What's happening here?
- **SHARE WORDS** Provide experiences for your child that will introduce new words, such as visiting a farm or going to a zoo.
- **SHARE RHYMES** Share nursery rhymes with your child. Literacy experts suggest that children who know eight nursery rhymes by heart at age four will be among the best readers by the time they are eight years old.
- **SHARE SONGS** There are numerous songs your child should be introduced to that are about farms and farm animals. In addition to those we shared in storytime, these include "Bingo," "Five Little Ducks," "Old MacDonald Had a Farm," and "Mary Had a Little Lamb."
- **SHARE STORIES** Research shows that a child's ability to tell stories will help her understand what she reads. As you share a book together, ask your child to retell the story using the illustrations as visual cues.
- **SHARE PLAYTIME** Act out "The Farmer in the Dell" with stuffed animals or other toys.
- **SHARE WRITING** Ask your child to draw a picture about a story you have shared.

Here are the words to the songs and rhymes that you and your child enjoyed today. By continuing to sing, chant, and play with your child throughout the week, you will help him or her make sense of the new information and concepts introduced at storytime.
