## Tips, Songs, and Rhymes for Parents and Caregivers

Here are ideas and activities to try this week with your child. Each activity is based on one of the **7 Days • 7 Ways** principles of early literacy development and is designed to engage your child, stimulate his or her literacy skills, and enhance the bonds between you.

- **SHARE BOOKS** Informational books provide different and more complex vocabulary than story books. Share books on topics that interest your child, like ocean life.
- **SHARE WORDS** Share unfamiliar ocean and sea life words: coral, shoreline, kelp, plankton, algae, barrier reef, sea urchin, scallops, sponge, grouper, trout, bass, shellfish, clown fish, lobster, oyster. Repeat new words several times so your child learns how to pronounce them.
- **SHARE RHYMES** Point out rhyming word pairs as you read rhymes to your child and see if she is able to pair rhyming words. Ask her to provide rhyming words, for example, for the word “fish” (dish, wish, swish, squish).
- **SHARE SONGS** Children love the “Shark Song” we did in storytime. Act it out with your child. Also, share other songs on this theme, like “Down by the Bay,” and have your child make up a new verse.
- **SHARE STORIES** Explain the term “fish tale” to your child (an exaggerated tale of the size of a fish that was caught). Make up an exaggerated story (how many hotcakes you ate, how far you can jump or swim, how many times you sneezed today, and so on). Then see if your child can make up a fish tale.
- **SHARE PLAYTIME** Put plastic fish and other sea creatures in the bathtub for a special bath time. Use the animals to make up a sea story, and have your child help.
- **SHARE WRITING** Print the word “Fish” on a piece of paper. Provide a tray (or shallow pan) of sand, and invite your child to use her finger to copy the word in the sand.

Here are the words to the songs and rhymes that you and your child enjoyed today. By continuing to sing, chant, and play with your child throughout the week, you will help him or her make sense of the new information and concepts introduced at storytime.

### Songs

#### Moving Hands

(sung to the tune of “The Farmer in the Dell”)

Put your hands on your head, (*Motions follow actions*)

Put your hands on your knees,

Put your hands behind you now,

If you please.

Put your hands on your tummy,

Put your hands on your toes,

Put your hands in the air,

(*Wink or point to eye; wave goodbye*)

Wearing a happy smile. (*Point to your smile*)

At the end of the ride, the lady was inside, (*Rub tummy*)

And the smile was on the crocodile! (*Point to your smile*)

## Rhymes

### Crocodile
